The first weeks of September were very busy at Crawford Bay School with the students learning about Truth and Reconciliation and the history of Indigenous people in British Columbia and Canada.

The students worked on many projects leading up to Orange Shirt Day. Classes beaded orange shirts, read books, and did thoughtful hallway displays, helping students of all ages understand what the thousands of children that attended Residential Schools experienced.

An assembly was held on Orange Shirt Day, students watched a video of Phyllis Webstad telling her story of how Orange Shirt Day originated. Students then colored cutout leaves and wrote words on them that helped them feel safe and happy at school. The feathers were made into a colorful hallway display. Everyone then went outside to participate in drum songs and planting of a remembrance Mountain Ash Tree.

This year we are excited to have Grandmother Donna coming again to drum with the classes. In June, last year, Crawford Bay School held a special celebration day honoring Grandmother Donna Wright. We presented her with the embroidered quilit that the whole school worked on. Everyone then enjoyed a traditional feast that the students made. It was a wonderful day.

We plan to accomplish many projects to deepen our understanding of Indigenous culture and history.
